Tournaments played a significant role in my early karate years. In 1971 whilst living in Japan, I received my referees diploma under the auspices of WUKO (World Union of Karate Organizations). Later that same year, I entered Ed Parker's famous Long Beach annual tournament in California, USA, which was also attended by Bruce Lee.

Many years later in January 1984, I officially started Go-Kan-Ryu (GKR) Karate, although I originally named it 'Bob's Karate School'. After a time and as the club grew, I started to run my own GKR Karate tournaments. The first one from memory was held in a primary school classroom and had only about 10 participants, and as many spectators. We've come a long way since then as we approach this amazing 2024 World Cup with 1400 + competitors and several thousand spectators.

As you may have also heard or worked out, the 2024 World Cup coincides with GKR's 40th birthday which gives us all another reason to celebrate. To be honest, starting GKR feels just like yesterday to me, and I still have clear memories of those early days. I was 36 years old then and will turn 77 this October. Wow, what an amazing 40 years! I am both excited and grateful to see GKR Karate in such great shape in 2024 and know without question that it will continue securely way beyond my lifetime. Given we are an international karate family, let's all have a great time renewing old friendships and making new ones.

WE CAN ALL BE WINNERS

After months of preparation, the moment to step in the ring has finally arrived. Despite everyone wanting the World Title, the reality is, only one person in each division can walk away with it. This means many of you will potentially leave disappointed, a feeling I'm familiar with. In 2001, I competed in a full-contact World Titles in Japan. Despite knocking my first-round Japanese opponent down twice, somehow the Judges awarded him the win. I was devastated. Thankfully, Kancho Sullivan was present to offer some perspective that helped me through future losses (in both karate and life).

He posed the true purpose of a goal is not it's achievement, but that it entices us to become the person we need to become to achieve it. If my pursuit of this goal had resulted in physical improvements (technique, fitness, flexibility, coordination, speed, strength etc) then surely I should consider that a major win? And if this process polished my character – something that serves me in every area of life (improved discipline, persistence, self-belief, confidence etc) is that not worth celebrating? He was right on both counts. I had to accept the journey had been a major win for me. Ultimately, what we get in life is far less important than who we become.

Before you step in the ring (and good luck on your goal), take a moment to realise all the ways this tournament has inspired you to improve yourself, and take pride in that. Regardless of your result, this World Cup has already been a big win for you!

SPECTATORS

CODE OF CONDUCT

- Remember that children compete for their enjoyment. Please ensure you behave in a manner that enables this enjoyment.
- Remember that children learn best by example. Applaud good performances by all competitors, from all countries. And congratulate all competitors regardless of the result.
- Praise your child for competing fairly and giving it their best. Focus on their efforts and performance rather than winning or losing.
 Never let your child feel defeated by the outcome.
- Never ridicule or yell at any competitor (either during or after a bout) for making a mistake or losing.
- Demonstrate appropriate social behaviour by avoiding the use of foul or abusive language around any parent, spectator, competitor or official.
- Show appreciation of volunteer officials and administrators.
 Without them, the event could not take place.

- Note that all Referees and Judges are not only volunteers but complete a Refereeing Accreditation course on a regular basis.
- Respect official's decisions and teach children to do likewise. You may not always agree with how a Judge awards a kata bout, or a point in kumite, but they are trained to understand and focus on the many factors that draw these conclusions.
- If you have a concern, approach the ring's administration table immediately after a bout and speak with the Senior Referee. This excludes whether you feel a Referee awarded a point correctly.
- Note that we do not review video footage to determine if a point was incorrectly judged. We will only review video footage where someone feels the ring's administration table failed to properly recognise the Referee's awarding of a point.



We know that in every corner of the GKR Karate world, there are countless students with an incredible personal story to tell about how karate training has positively impacted their lives.


These unassuming and often humble everyday superstars are an immeasurable source of motivation to those around them, and we thought it was time to recognise their amazing accomplishments.

As a tribute to one of our most beloved GKR Karate members, we have decided this year to name one of our Black Belt divisions the

Ann Eyes Commemorative Trophy.

Ann Eyes was a much-loved student and instructor in GKR Karate Wellington, New Zealand for 2 decades. Ann was the closest thing we had to 'GKR Royalty' in New Zealand, and she travelled to many of our international karate events over the years to compete and officiate. As a result, Ann was very well-known amongst the student and instructor group in both Australia and the UK.

In late 2020 and at the age of 76, Ann's many years of training culminated in being awarded her 4th Dan Black Belt at a special ceremony conducted by Renshi Antonie de Bruin.

Sadly, Ann lost her battle with cancer a short time after this, leaving a large void in the spirit of our GKR Karate New Zealand community.

Following Ann's passing, we received requests from some of Ann's fellow competitors who felt that her legacy should be memorialized at our biggest international event. With many thanks to these people (most notably Anne Noonan from ACT), we are excited to award the winners of the 65+ Women's Black Belt Division with an Ann Eyes Commemorative Trophy.

Ann's character, energy and positivity were matched only by her tenacity and fighting spirit and we can think of no better way to honour her contribution to GKR.


